## Mission Statement

The Delaware Lottery's mission is to maximize revenue contributions to the state's General Fund, thereby helping to fund the delivery of state services to the people of Delaware through the marketing, sale and distribution of innovative, entertaining and secure Lottery products that ensure the public's confidence in the honesty and integrity of the games.

## A history of delivering for Delaware

 The Delaware Lottery was established by the state Legislature in 1975 as a means of generating revenue to supplement the state's General Fund without placing an additional tax burden on citizens.Since its inception, the Lottery has grown in a steady and orderly manner, marketing a variety of games that offers players many chances to win hundreds, thousands or millions of dollars in prizes. Growing public support over the years has made the Lottery in Delaware one of the most successful in the nation.

New games, new drawing technologies and the start-up of Video Lottery operations at the state's three racetracks have made the Delaware Lottery more successful than many originally expected. But helping to pay for needed state services with the profits it generates has and continues to be the main purpose of the Delaware Lottery. In fulfilling this purpose, the Lottery has, since 1975 , successfully generated a total of more than $\$ 616.9$ million for the General Fund. At the same time, the Lottery has returned millions of dollars in prizes to thousands of winning players.

As in previous years, this year's contribution to the General Fund and awarding of prizes more than met the minimum legislative requirements for distribution of Lottery revenue. In part, this is due to the continuing growth in Lottery revenues, but it also can be attributed to the good stewardship of funds used to manage the Lottery's operations, administration and promotion of its games.

The Delaware Lottery, during the past two decades, has continued to grow and evolve. The quality, security and quantity of its games have increased, and its commitment to technology includes the recent computer animation and randomization of our games. It is the goal of the Lottery to continue - with ongoing public support- "delivering for Delaware."

## Delivering for the Delaware General Fund

The Lottery management, staff, retailers and suppliers are proud to be generating millions of dollars each year to help pay for essential state services that would otherwise require additional tax dollars.

During the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1998, the Lottery transferred to the General Fund a record total of $\$ 125.4$ million in revenue generated from the sale of Lottery tickets and profits from the Video Lottery. This represents a significant portion of the total state budget, making the Lottery the fourth-largest generator of revenue for the General Fund. This record contribution to the General Fund was a 30.6 percent increase over the Lottery's FY 1997 contribution.

Legislative allocations from the General Fund provide the funding for most of the state's agencies. Among them are:

## The Department of Services for Children, Youth and Their Families,

 which promotes positive change in the behavior of the children and families in its care. It offers various programs, including services for children with mental, emotional and/or substance abuse issues; child abuse intervention services; programs for preventing child abuse, dependency, neglect, juvenile delinquency, and drug and alcohol abuse; and services for delinquent youth. It also runs a Crisis Help hot line for child abuse and neglect.The Department of Education, which partners with school districts and educational groups to see that the best educational practices are identified, funded and implemented throughout the state. The Department also ensures that public support for education is cultivated so that all students develop the ability to reason, exhibit good citizenship, and gain the knowledge and self-esteem necessary to become contributing members of society. The General Fund helps support both public and higher education in Delaware.

The Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control, which protects and manages the state's natural resources, provides outdoor recreation and educates citizens about conservation practices. Under its jurisdiction are the divisions of Soil and Water Conservation, Water Resources, Air and Waste Management, Fish and Wildlife, and Parks and Recreation.

The Department of Health and Social Services, which is the fifthlargest employer in the state. It offers a variety of community-based services, such as child support enforcement and services for the aged and adults with disabilities. Also among its 11 different divisions are the Medical Examiner's Office, the Division of Mental Retardation, the Division of Alcoholism and the Division of Public Health - the largest segment of the Department.

The Department of Public Safety, which includes several agencies concerned with public safety. They are the Delaware State Police, the Office of Highway Safety, the M otor Vehicle Division, the Capitol Police, Alcoholic Beverage Control, Boiler Safety, the Delaware Emergency Management Agency and the Division of Communications, which includes the administration of the 911 Emergency Reporting System.

Imagine how many individuals, families and communities across the First State are benefiting from the vital state services and programs that receive money from the General Fund. Now, try to imagine taxpayers shouldering the burden of an additional $\$ 125.4$ million that would be needed if it were not for the Lottery profits contributed to the General Fund. The reality is that the Lottery is delivering for all of us in Delaware.


## The Delaware Lottery delivers for players

The Lottery offers players a wide selection of games to play for fun and entertainment. They include pick-your-own-numbers games with daily drawings, growing multimillion-dollar jackpot games with drawings several times a week, special theme games, numerous instant ticket games and the popular Video Lottery games at the three racetracks in the state.

All games give players a fair chance to win prizes that range from the cost of the game ticket to hundreds and thousands of dollars. Over the years, Delaware Lottery POW ERBALL® players have won three multimillion-dollar jackpots and 129 prizes worth $\$ 100,000$ each. Also, Delaware Lottery players have won 19 Lotto game jackpots worth one million dollars or more.


## The Delaware Lottery delivers responsibly

Like other lotteries throughout the country, the Delaware Lottery is proactive in encouraging players to play the games responsibly. In addition to the money already channeled into the Department of Health and Social Services through the General Fund, the Lottery now also supports that Department's problem gambling programs. In 1998, that support amounted to more than $\$ 864,500$ in funding for those special programs.

What's more, the "Play Responsibly" message and the Delaware Gambling Helpline number (1-888-850-8888) appear on all printed Delaware Lottery materials, Video Lottery terminals and retailer ticket terminals, along with a statement (shown above) that encourages those who have a gambling problem, or those who know someone who does, to call.

At the Delaware Lottery, we believe no one benefits when they abuse something good. That's why we encourage players to keep their lottery playing in perspective and only play our games when they can afford to do so. After all, the Lottery games are a form of entertainment designed to raise funds to help pay for state services that otherwise would require funding with additional tax dollars.

So, when Delawareans play our games responsibly, we all win.

## The Lottery delivers for the Delaware business community

The Delaware Lottery takes pride in being an integral part of the state's business community. Like any successful business, we rely heavily on our sales force. For the Delaware Lottery, that means a network of more than 450 retailers up and down the state. All sell Instant Game tickets, and more than 330 are equipped with lottery computer terminals needed to sell tickets for the on-line games. They "talk up" the games, promoting Lottery tickets as another high-quality product on their shelves. They also enjoy commissions from selling these tickets, plus the extra business that Lottery traffic brings to their stores.

Along with our Lottery Retailers, other Delawareans benefit from the business of the Lottery. They include our employees, suppliers, vendors, and the local print and broadcast media that help us promote our games.

The Lottery is a truly successful Delaware business venture.
